

**J. PULLEY, 76,

42 Years Dead—
Directed Its Clinic

William J. Pulley, a physi-
cally specialized in diagnosis
a member of the faculty
New York University Col-
lege of Medicine for forty-two
years died of a heart attack yes-
terday at his home, 100 West Fifty-
second St. His age was 76. He
directed the faculty in 1934.

Huntville, Ala., Dr. Pul-
ley graduated in 1891 from the
Hospital Medical College, New
York University College of
Medicine. He served as an in-
tern at Bellevue Hospital and
as a medical college faculty
member for many years he was
director of the college's clinic. He
held the title of Professor of
Internal Medicine. As director of
the hospital he originated a series of
lectures for under-
graduates of the Bellevue

Pulley received the New
York University Alumni Meritorious
Award in 1932. He was

Edmund Gutfreund, long a
resident here, died yesterday
of a heart attack on a train at
Tallahassee, Fla., on his way to
Florida where he was to spend his
vacation. His age was 81.
His retirement two years
ago Gutfreund was head of
the company's Olympia Market, with
a retail plant at 425 West Sev-
enth Street. His company dis-
tributed meats to social centers
throughout the country, including
R. I. Palm Beach, Fla.,

Gutfreund came to this country at
the age of 15, and went to work
for the World Beef Company. Sev-
eral years later he opened a retail
business on lower Second

**PUTNAM B. STRONG,
SON OF EX-MAYOR, 70**

Maj. Putnam Bradlee Strong,
whose elopement in 1899 with
"Madcap May" Yohe, the late stage
actress and wife of Lord Francis
Hope, owner of the Hope diamond,
was a newspaper sensation, died
at his home in Culpeper, Va., on
Tuesday at the age of 70, it was
learned yesterday.

The only son of the late William
L. Strong, who was Republican
Mayor here from 1895 to 1897,
Major Strong was born in this city.
He was appointed to West Point
and compiled a promising record
there. Volunteering for service in
the Spanish-American War, he was
stationed in the Philippines, where
he served throughout that cam-
paign.

He and Miss Yohe had met at
the apartment here that she main-
tained with Lord Hope, to whom
she had been married in London
despite the bitter opposition of his
family.

Their paths crossed again in San
Francisco when divorce proceed-
ings between her husband and her-
self were pending. Major Strong
and the actress left on a vessel
bound for Japan.

Major Strong was allowed to re-
sign from the Army and, after
Lord Hope obtained a divorce, he
and Miss Yohe were married.
After three years of travel throug-
hout the world, the couple returned
to the United States in 1905 and
separated, with a final divorce
being granted five years later.
Miss Yohe died in August, 1938, in
Boston, where she worked as a
WPA clerk.

**FRANK A. NEWTON,
UTILITY RATE MAN**

Supervisor for Commonwealth
and Southern Corp. Dies—
Headed Research Unit

Frank A. Newton of Summit,
N. J., rate supervisor for the Com-
monwealth and Southern Corpora-
tion, one of the nation's largest
utility holding company systems,
died yesterday of a heart attack in
Peoria, Ill., according to word re-
ceived here. He was 61 years old.

Born in Sparta, Wis., Mr. New-
ton attended the College of Engi-
neering at the University of Wis-
consin. After graduation he joined
the United States Reclamation
Service in Colorado, later going to
the Geological Service and the Wis-
consin Railroad Commission. In
1912 he became a staff member of
Hodenpyl Hardy & Co., a utility
consulting firm.

Upon formation of Common-
wealth & Southern in 1929, Mr.
Newton was placed in general su-
pervisory charge of rates for the
company. He was chairman of the
rate research committee of the
Edison Electric Institute for more
than ten years and was a frequent
contributor to technical and trade
publications.

He leaves a widow, Bertha Rich-
ardson Newton; two daughters,
Mrs. Gladys Newton Handley and
Miss Marjorie Jean Newton; a son,
Robert H. Newton of Jackson,
Mich., and two granddaughters.

EDWARD WERNER

Ex-Vice Minister of Finance of
Poland Had LECTURED Here

Edward Werner, former Vice
Minister of Finance of Poland,
died of a heart attack on Tuesday
in his home, 435 West 119th Street.
His age was 67.

An active Lutheran layman, Mr.
Werner had lectured widely in re-
cent years in the United States
and Canada on religious matters
and on Poland, from which he had
escaped in 1939 after undergoing
the German bombardment of War-
saw.

Born in Warsaw, Mr. Werner at-
tended the Academy of Commerce
in Vienna and studied economics in
London and Berlin. He had been a
Judge of the Polish Court of Com-
merce and at one time he was a
Warsaw Councilman. He opposed
the introduction of the state to-
bacco monopoly in Poland in 1924
and ten years later was Vice Min-
ister of Finance, with all the State
monopolies under his authority.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs.
Maria Ciechomska of Warsaw, and
a son, Lieut. Karol Werner of the
Polish Army in England. Another
daughter, Countess Zofia Dunin,
was killed by German machine
gun bullets early in the recent war.

John B. Reimer, vice president
and a trustee of the Richmond Hill
Savings Bank in Queens and for-
merly for twenty-five years treas-
urer of the Union Congregational
Church of Richmond Hill, died
Thursday in his home, 234 Green-
way North, Forest Hills, Queens,
after a brief illness. His age
was 74.

Born in Brooklyn, Mr. Reimer
attended New-Looks Academy there.
In 1888 he moved to Queens and
started a coal and building busi-
ness that he conducted for many
years at Ozone Park. He was
president of the First National
Bank of Ozone Park until it merged
with the Bank of the Manhat-
tan Company, and at his death was
a member of the Queens County
advisory committee of the latter
bank. He formerly was president
of the Queencrest Development
Corporation.

Mr. Reimer served with the
Twenty-third Regiment, New York
Guard, in the first World War. He
was a member of the American
Society for Psychical Research and
wrote articles on his experiences
and investigation of psychical
phenomena. He had been a mem-
ber of the Masons, the Queensboro
Chamber of Commerce and the
former Queens Valley Golf Club.

A widower, he leaves a daughter,

Hills; two sons, Alfred B. of Ojai,
Calif., and Otto B. Reimer of
